On behalf of the Foundation of City College of San Francisco, I am pleased to send you the 2015 Annual Report. The generosity and support of the citizens of the San Francisco area for CCSF has continued during fiscal year 2014- 2015. The Foundation received contributions totaling \$1,104,000 from individuals, corporations and foundations. That, plus earnings on investment of the Foundation's \$17 million of assets, enabled the Foundation to provide scholarship and other support of \$1.4 million to the students of City College.

One indication of the level of community support is the, always successful, Basic Skills Luncheon organized by the Foundation's Auxiliary which was held on September 15th in the beautiful Fairmont Hotel. With underwriting by Wells Fargo and Chevron, over 300 ladies and gentlemen attended the luncheon, which netted nearly \$200,000 for the support of Basic Skills classes and the Guardian Scholars program for former foster youth.

Wells Fargo also provided underwriting of CCSF's graduation in May which permitted the Foundation to host a reception for graduates and their friends and family.

Additionally, the Foundation sponsored a reception on November 7, 2015 in recognition of the retirement of Coach George Rush (who has joined the Board of Directors of the Foundation) and in celebration of the George Rush Stadium naming event. That was followed on November 13th by Scholarship Recognition Day when students receive their scholarships and have the opportunity to thank personally the many donors whose gifts have provided scholarship funding.

The accomplishments of this year were clearly a great team effort with enormous contributions by the faculty, administrative staff and entire CCSF organization which provides a high quality education for the 70,000 students of CCSF.



City College continued its outstanding record of providing an excellent educational experience for students, earning City College some of the best student outcome results in the entire California Community College System. Kudos to the faculty and staff!

In June of 2015, Susan Lamb was appointed Interim Chancellor by the Board of Trustees. Her appointment was very popular with the faculty and staff of CCSF and she is providing the leadership needed to complete the final steps in the accreditation process.

Much was accomplished in 2014-2015 and we look forward to your help as we take on future tasks in support of the mission of City College.

Thank you for your continued support of the Foundation of CCSF.

A Message from Susan Lamb, Interim Chancellor



In the short time that I have served as Chancellor of City College of San Francisco, I have witnessed a profound outpouring of support from the philanthropic community. It is because of such unrelenting commitment from our donors that we are able to continually provide educational opportunities to thousands of students each year.

As someone who has spent almost 30 years in community colleges from a classroom teacher to an administrator, I know that our two-year community college system provides access to those who have traditionally not had higher education opportunities. City College is no exception. We have a strong history of serving the many citizens and communities of San Francisco.

City College provides a myriad of opportunities for personal enrichment, economic advancement, and access to higher education. Students may begin by taking a single course, such as an immigrant enrolling in an English as a Second Language class, opening doors to citizenship, a higher quality of life, an associate degree and the possible doctorate. Working adults, who often have families to support, may take accounting or computer programming classes in the evenings to secure a better job, to gain additional pay, or to get a promotion. High school students come to City College with the goal of making “real money” by entering a Career and Technical Education program like CityBuild or the Bridge to Bioscience program which link directly into internships and jobs.

Our students come from many different backgrounds and experiences. We have working adults, first generation college students, homeless students, students who have been incarcerated, high school students, veterans returning from active duty, and foster youth. These students, ranging in age from 15 to 90-years-old, have a variety of socioeconomic backgrounds, and come from a wide range of cultures and ethnicities. It is the shared experience and the diversity that these students bring to the classroom which make City College special.



Together, with the support that the College receives from donors and the Foundation of City College of San Francisco, we provide students with opportunities that would not otherwise be available to them. We are truly grateful for your continued support and confidence in our College.

A Day to Remember: CCSF Graduation May 22, 2015

deserved. Learning of the great job CCSF has done with the students and the difficult road they have been on made me so happy to have assisted them with a hand-up through the Foundation.

It is really hard to say which part of the ceremony I liked the most:

- The Mayor of San Francisco, Ed Lee, offering to help the school in any way he could and delivering a great speech on his background and own struggles in the San Francisco offices he held before becoming Mayor.
- Susan Lamb our Interim Chancellor, Rafael

Mandelman, President of the Board of Trustees and many other dignitaries all contributed wonderful and thoughtful speeches.

- Among these amazing personalities, I think my most inspirational speaker was student Joseph Ramirez. He shared with us all the obstacles both financial and social that stood in his way, and how he overcame them to triumph and receive two degrees. Soon he will move on to university. Many wept at his comments.

Perhaps one of the funniest stories came from Larry Baer, the SF Giants CEO. He shared a story with us about his early career in communications at Cal Berkeley. At the brash age of 21 he secured a deal with the Oakland A's to broadcast their games on the Cal radio network. The then legendary Oakland A's Owner, Charley Finley, a real nickel squeezing owner found himself without

a radio station to broadcast A's games. A financial dispute had left him high and dry. Larry, recognizing an opportunity, called him and brashly asked for the rights to broadcast all the A's games on the Cal FM network for the campus. After Charley stopped laughing, he agreed, for a \$5 charge. A great story for the graduating students about opportunity and how to seize it.

I really enjoyed the Commencement Ceremony and strongly suggest that all of our Foundation Community attend the next one: you won't be disappointed.

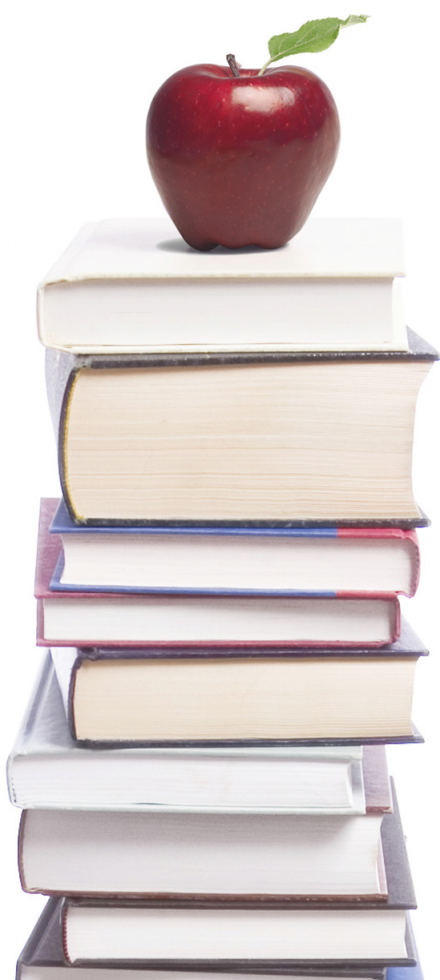
The Auxiliary of the Foundation of City College of San Francisco

The Auxiliary of the Foundation of City College of San Francisco was founded in 2003 with 6 members, and has grown in 2016 to 145!! Their purpose is to provide volunteer services and financial assistance to CCSF, as well as to create outreach into the community (to increase public awareness and support of CCSF.)

Their major fundraising event is a luncheon given annually to support the Basic Skills program at CCSF. The first luncheon, presented at the World Trade Club at the Ferry building was a great success. Major

corporate support by Wells Fargo and Chevron, guest favors from See's Chocolate, Boudin Breads, John's Grill wines, and Ghirardelli chocolate established a grand reputation for the luncheon over the years. As attendance continued to grow, the luncheon moved to the St. Francis Hotel on Union Sq., and then on to the Fairmont Hotel atop Nob Hill.



The luncheon traditionally features a former Basic Skills student, who has gone on to great success, as well as prominent speakers from the San Francisco community. These student stories of overcoming severe obstacles in their youth, while continuing to pursue their education and dreams always inspire the audience to support the basic skills program. They often offer financial aid, jobs, and mentoring to the upcoming graduates. The auxiliary keeps the costs of the September luncheon to a minimum with their volunteer services and with help from major community sponsors.

In the past 11 years the Auxiliary has raised over 2.5 million dollars for the Basic Skills Program (Scholarships and Books) and more than 3000 scholarships have been awarded. The 12th annual luncheon will take place on September 20, 2016 at the Fairmont Hotel in the Grand Ballroom. It will continue the tradition of improving the future lives of these CCSF students, those most in need of support to excel. A very Basic success.



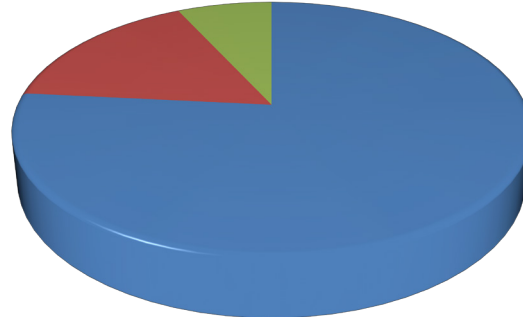

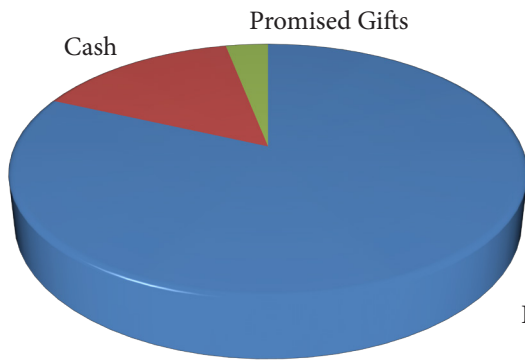

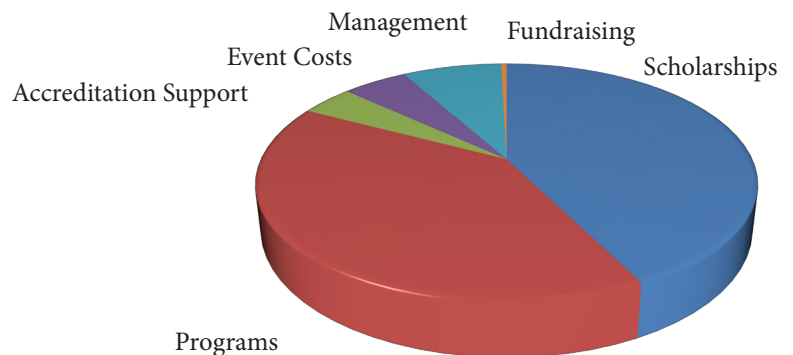
